

From Secretary's Desk ...

The onset of the pandemic in the beginning of this year was over whelming for all! There was lock down imposed in the State and it was not a known phenomenon for us! There was challenge to get the work done in the office without the staff! Finance year end, ending of some projects, reporting back to the funders and so on!

Colleagues at Aaina has been quite helpful and innovative in any awkward and disaster situation. Very soon all of us got acquainted to the online space, meeting, getting the work done and reporting! Probably the NEW NORMAL as they say! There was lockdown imposed for physical commutation, mobility, visits etc but there was no limit to our mental exercise and the series of webinars on Covid management with volunteers and civil society ignited with ideas and means to reach out to people. The first thing came to our mind is how this lockdown would have impacted on people in the field area specifically on children, women and people with disabilities. Based on our experience on psycho-social intervention space we managed to produce a manual with the able guidance and support of Prof Namita Mohanty (Psychology) on Psycho social counseling for the use of the field workers and an intense orientation to our field staff on it got organised.


We collaborated with CYSD and other civil society organization and initiated citizen's action forum and a toll free helpline got introduced for people to get information related to Covid, on domestic violence and other challenges. We ourself conducted a number of webinars on various issues including organsing Global Menstrual Hygiene Day, Girl Child day and so on!

Thans to Sense India International who supported the first relief package of the children with deafblindness and that encouraged us to operate with relief support to more than 3000 families in Bhubaneswar Municipality Corporation with the support of WIPRO Foundation. Thanks are also due to The Mahindra for the relief support provided to the vulnerable families in Kanas Block.

To keep the children engaged during the School closure due to lockdown we collaborated with MoSchool Abhiyan, Dept of DWCD-ICPS and Unicef and through Kallola we managed to reach out to 500 children with Script writing workshop and Radio jingle making workshop on Covid & Children. Which was definitely a huge achievement during this covid time, as it is said the disaster also brings the opportunity it gave us the opportunity to work with 500 children which would have limited to 50-100 had it been offline! The 5 days online festival with the children bringing number of guests from diverse background was a wonderful and satisfying experience even during this limited period. I take this opportunity to acknowledge the help of the volunteers specifically Arya, Shalini & Shreya along with colleagues in Aaina for this piece of work.

Thanks to our Auditor NRSM Associates who augmented the online auditing during this time and got it done with limited physical exposure which was beyond the imagination! Covid has taught a big lesson to all of us in adapting the situation and getting the job done with due diligent.

A big Thanks to all the colleagues, members, well wishers, volunteers and all the children, women and people with disabilities in the field those extended their cooperation during this hour to carry forward the services to humanity with this challenging time.





ABOUT AAINA

"Realization being the Guiding Mantra, Creativity and Inclusion the Spirit" we at Aaina are committed to promote inclusion in its true sense wherever and whenever possible. The action or state of including or of being included within a group or structure as a whole means Inclusion. Inclusion means change!! We believe both inclusion and change are inevitable. Whether we choose to grow with and from these changes is a choice. This also means including the people those are historically marginalised and accepted as they are. Thus the larger sector create space to their need than asking them to change to fit into the system or society. Aaina has been trying to promote inclusion of people and children with disability in the development arena through its very focused projects. They remain vital stakeholders of all the projects and their participation is interwoven in working strategy of Aaina.

'Amo Vidyalaya' which was the first ever community level program of Aaina came into existence in the year 1998 at Baranga, Cuttack, It acts as a platform for children with disability to be a visible part of the society, learn and grow together in a non residential model, catering services to the children with disability for mainstreaming. Along with education vocational training is also another part of the curriculum for the older one to become independent in the near future.

The inclusive children clubs approach made the process of Inclusion much easier in villages and Schools and remains another strong example of social inclusion of children and children with disability. We believe that, "Children those study together learn to stay together in future". The aim of the children's clubs is to give a voice to excluded children and promote their rights. Today there are children's clubs in every village of Aaina's intervention where children participate and discuss social issues affecting them and society in general. To support their voices Child Protection Committees are formed and developed where children not only raise issue but are very much part of the committees and share their issues with service providers. This platform is available in the district of Kandhamal, Ganjam, Boudh and Dhenkanal of Odisha and now regular talks is happening to include them in ICPS model in terms of sustainability.

Facilitating people with disability through economic and social empowerment have made them realize their capabilities and get mainstreamed in society. Through Ananya project 151 SHGs of persons with disability got training under NABARD and were linked to various lead banks to be fully functional and some of them are running their IGP activities individually and also in groups. It not only changes the mindset of the individual but also the community as a whole towards persons with disabilities.


Aaina continues programs at various levels for the people with disability to supplement the cause of Inclusion. Regular orientation programs are organized for both government



officials and the various stake holders including PRI representatives, school-teachers, members of community etc. Besides attempts are also made to ensure that the various facilities given to this special groups reaches them such as aids and appliances, scholarships for children, IAY, disability certificate, bus and train pass. Sensitization and bringing visibility to the potential of the PWDs made the Inclusion process easier and smooth.





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

Report on the standalone Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying Standalone Financial Statements of AAINA, Plot No: 70/3530, Ground Floor, Jayadev Vihar, Bhubaneswar – 751013, Odisha a society registered under the Societies Registration Act which comprise the Balance Sheet as at 31st March 2021 and Statement of Income & Expenditure and Statement of Receipt & Payment which for the year then ended and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibility of Management for the Standalone Financial Statements

The Society's Management are responsible with respect to the preparation of these standalone financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position, financial performance and the statement of Receipt and Payment in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India. 

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
